Terri Lynne Lokoff Child Care Foundation National Child Care Teacher Awards Program

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CRIMINAL JUSTICE AND MENTAL HEALTH

U.S. Department of Justice

Criminal Justice and Mental Health Systems Collaboration Program

Program: Through the Criminal Justice and Mental Health Systems Collaboration Program, the Department of Justice will provide funds to improve public safety by improving collaboration between the criminal justice and mental health systems. The goals of the program are to:

- Protect public safety by early intervention to treatment for people with mental illness or a co-occurring disorder who become involved with the criminal or juvenile justice system. This includes strategies to address development and learning disabilities and problems arising from a documented history of physical or sexual abuse.
- Provide courts, including existing and new mental health courts, with appropriate mental health and substance abuse treatment options.
- Maximize the use of diversion from prosecution and use of alternative sentences through community supervision and use of graduated sanctions, as appropriate for the client, in cases involving nonviolent offenders with mental illness.
- Promote adequate training for criminal justice system personnel about mental illness and substance abuse disorders and the appropriate responses to people with such illnesses, including those with developmental and learning disabilities.
- Promote adequate training for mental health and substance abuse treatment personnel about criminal offenders with mental illness or co-occurring substance abuse disorders and the appropriate response to such offenders in the criminal justice system.
- Promote communication among adult or juvenile justice personnel, mental health and co-occurring mental illness and substance abuse disorder treatment personnel, and nonviolent offenders with mental illness and co-occurring mental health and substance abuse disorders and support services such as housing, job placement, faith-based and community services, schools, child welfare, transportation, and crime victims' organizations.
- Promote communication, collaboration, and intergovernmental partnerships among municipal, county, and state-elected officials with respect to mentally ill offenders.

Funds: Maximum grant size: \$50,000 for planning; \$250,000 for planning and implementation; and \$200,000 for implementation and expansion grants

Eligible: State and local governments submitting joint applications; each application must demonstrate that the proposed project will be managed jointly by a mental health agency and a unit of government with responsibility for criminal justice activities

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

National Network to End Domestic Violence Allstate Education and Job Training Fund

Program: The Allstate Foundation has partnered with the National Network to End Domestic Violence to establish the Education and Job Training Assistance Fund. The fund channels small grants to survivors of domestic violence in order to help them to achieve their educational and job-related goals. Survivors can receive for specific educational and training needs. The fund is intended to help survivors achieve greater independence over their financial lives, as well as establish options for their future. The Education and Job Training Assistance Fund supports career advancement activities, including professional licenses, workforce tools, and additional job training. Specific examples consist of:

- licensing fees for professionals such as nurses and social workers;
- books and supplies for school;
- job skills training;
- tuition;
- requirements for jobs, including uniforms and tools;
- registration fees;
- temporary child care so that the applicant can attend school, take a class, or look for employment;
- public transportation; and
- rental fees for computer time at a computer center.

East Boston and Chelsea Environmental Fund Request for Proposals

- Program:** The East Boston/Chelsea Environmental Fund at the Boston Foundation seeks to support environmental projects, programs, and organizations based or working in Chelsea and East Boston, Massachusetts. Priority is placed on educational and recreational activities that impact the youth of the two communities. The goal of the fund is to develop strong environmental stewardship and leadership in the East Boston and Chelsea communities, especially among the next generation of residents. The East Boston / Chelsea Environmental Fund at the Boston Foundation was established as the result of the settlement of a legal dispute over the proposed use of Chelsea Creek tidelands. Beginning in March 2007, grants will be distributed annually to nonprofit organizations for projects and programs conducted in Chelsea and East Boston, or for the benefit of residents of those communities. Grants will be distributed annually in March based on a December application. The fund will be dispersed over the next five years through a proposal process, with the expectation that the fund will be depleted and the last grants will be made in 2011. While the fund has a special interest in supporting educational and recreational programs for youth, other eligible environmental activities that meet the goal of developing environmental stewardship and leadership in East Boston and Chelsea might include advocacy, scientific testing, clean-up and restoration projects, or activities that engage adults in the environment. Agencies do not need to be based East Boston or Chelsea, but the activity for which support is requested must occur in those communities or be conducted for the benefit of East Boston or Chelsea residents.

Family to Family Health Care Information and Education Centers**

Program: The purpose of the initiative, Family to Family Health Care Information and Education Centers for Families of Children with Special Health Care Needs, is to reduce barriers to community living for people with disabilities and to address families' lack of access to the services, advocacy, and assistance they need as mandated in The Family Opportunity Act of 2005. This initiative ultimately will assist

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families of children with special health care needs to partner in decision-making at all levels. Grants will fund state-based, family-run centers providing information, education, technical assistance, and peer support to families. They will be responsible for developing partnerships with those organizations serving these children and their families and monitor the progress of programs with responsibility for payment and direct services of this population through a statewide data collection system.

Specifically, these centers will:

- 1) Assist families of children with special health care needs make informed choices about health care in order to promote good treatment decisions, cost effectiveness, and improved health outcomes;
- 2) Provide information regarding the health care needs of and resources available for children with special health care needs;
- 3) Identify successful health delivery models;
- 4) Develop with representatives of health care providers, managed care organization, health care purchasers, and appropriate state agencies, a model for collaboration between families of children with special health care needs and health professionals;
- 5) Provide training and guidance regarding the care of children with special health care needs;
- 6) Conduct outreach activities to families, health professionals, schools, and other appropriate entities; and
- 7) Be staffed by such families who have expertise in federal and state public and private health care systems and health providers.

U.S. Department of Justice Office of Justice Programs, Bureau of Justice Assistance Prisoner Reentry Initiative
