Grants to be made under this announcement will build upon what was learned as a result of the last cycle of male research projects funded by the Office of Family Planning, and will focus on utility, replicability, and cost-effectiveness. In addition to conducting an evaluation of their individual projects, successful applicants must be prepared to participate in a cross-site evaluation, to be conducted by an independent entity, to assess program efficiency and effectiveness across all projects funded under this announcement. In order to expand the research base on program utility, replicability, and cost-effectiveness of family planning and related health programs serving males, the department is soliciting applications for projects that focus on one or more of the following areas as they relate to males:

**Department Of Health And Human Services, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention
 Research on the Impact of Law on Public Health**

Program: The purpose of the program is to stimulate research evaluating the implementation and impact of law on the prevention and control of death, disease, injury, and disability, on health promotion, on the conduct of public health services, and on the public health system and infrastructure. In this context, law' means statutes, regulations, rules, contract specifications, licensing requirements, case law and other judicial rulings, and other legally enforceable policies of the federal government, state governments and their political subdivisions, tribes, and territories.
 Special emphasis will be given to research that will produce, on an accelerated basis, scientifically valid findings that can be used to improve law's contribution to public health preparedness for, and response to, terrorism, outbreaks of infectious disease, and other major public health threats and emergencies.

Funds: Approximately \$500,000 is available in FY 2003 to fund approximately three awards. Average award will be \$165,000, ranging from \$150,000 to \$250,000.
