Library of Congress

Kluge Center Fellowships for Humanistic and Social Science Research

Program: The Library of Congress Kluge Center Fellowships provide qualified scholars with funding to conduct research in the John W. Kluge Center using the Library of Congress collections and resources for a period of up to one year. Established in 2000 through an endowment of \$60 million from John W. Kluge, the Center is located in the Jefferson Building of the Library of Congress. The Kluge Center especially encourages humanistic and social science research that makes use of the Library's large and varied collections. Interdisciplinary, cross-cultural, or multi-lingual research is particularly welcome. Among the collections available to researchers are the world's largest law library and outstanding multi-lingual collections of books and periodicals. Deep special collections of manuscripts, maps, music, films, recorded sound, prints, and photographs are also available.

Funds: Stipend of \$3,500 per month for residential research at the Library of Congress. To cover transportation and other start-up costs, an amount of \$750 will be added to the initial stipend check for the United States and Canadian Fellows and \$1,500 for overseas Fellows. Housing is not provided by the Library of Congress. Up to twelve Kluge Fellowships will be awarded annually.

Deadline: August 15, 2002.
Eligible: Scholars who have received a terminal advanced degree within the past seven years in the humanities, social sciences, or in a professional field such as architecture or law are eligible. Applicants may be U.S. citizens or foreign nationals.

The Independent Television Service Open Call 2002

Program: The Independent Television Service (ITVS) funds, distributes, and promotes new programs primarily for public television. ITVS works with independent producers to create and present programs that take creative risks, advance issues, and represent points of view not usually seen on public or commercial television, and is committed to programming that addresses the needs of underserved and underrepresented audiences.

ITVS is currently accepting applications for grants through Round 2 of its Open Call 2002. Open Call 2002 provides funding for programs that will bring new audiences to public television as well as expand civic participation by bringing new voices into the public discourse. Independent producers or independent entities producing television, film, or video programs are eligible to apply. Under the program guidelines, "independent" production means: a production created under the artistic, budgetary, and editorial control of an independent producer or production entity owning the copyright, and that the individual applicants responsible for the production are not regularly employed by a public or commercial broadcast.

Funds: There is no minimum or maximum amount you may request.

Deadline: August 15, 2002

Eligible: To be eligible, independent producers must:

- ✓ Be at least 18 years old;
- ✓ Be a citizen or legal resident of the U.S. or its external territories;
- ✓ And have some previous film or television production experience in a principal role (producer, co-producer, director, or co-director) as demonstrated by a sample tape.

Eligible productions will be:

- ✓ Television programs in any genre, including drama, documentary, docudrama, animation, experimental works or innovative combinations;
- ✓ Single programs of standard broadcast length (56:40 or 26:40) (in rare cases, ITVS will consider programs at feature lengths);
- ✓ New productions or works-in-progress; and
- ✓ Programs that can be completed within one year of contract.

Program: The Area Poverty Centers cooperative agreements are for qualified institutions to provide a focused agenda expanding our understanding of the causes, consequences and effects of poverty in local geographic areas or specific substantive areas, especially in states or regional areas of high concentrations of poverty. These cooperative agreements are intended to create a research opportunity for scholars and institutions otherwise unlikely to participate extensively in HHS programs to support the Nation's poverty research effort. It

is anticipated that investigators supported under the Area Poverty Centers will benefit from the opportunity to conduct independent research; that the grantee institutions will benefit from participation in the diverse extramural programs of HHS; and that students will benefit from exposure to and participation in research and be encouraged to pursue graduate studies and careers in the social and behavioral sciences with a focus on poverty.
