#### Demonstration Projects that Improve Child Well-Being by Fostering Healthy Marriages within Underserved Communities

#### Training of Child Welfare Agency Supervisors in the Effective Delivery and Management of Federal Independent Living Service for Youth in Foster Care

Grant funds should be used to develop unique and innovative strategies that specifically address the workforce challenges of Limited English Proficient individuals and Hispanic Americans. Applications must reflect a strategic partnership among the public workforce investment system, the employer community, the education and training community, and, if applicable, community-based or faith-based organizations.
