Boston ROCKS Community Grants

Program: The goal of the Boston ROCKS Community Grants program is to increase the number and variety of programs serving youth and increase the number of youth who have access to positive opportunities and safe environments. The initiative will award funds to community-based organizations that will offer youth programming at City of Boston community centers and parks and for programs that can demonstrate the

ability to engage underserved youth in structured programs that address one or more of the following four areas of child development: arts, character-building, education, and sports, health, and nutrition (ACES). Applicants must meet the following program requirements:

- serve Boston youth between the ages of 8 and 18;
- take place in a Boston Centers for Youth and Families community center or City of Boston park;
- focus on one or more components of the ACES framework: arts, education, character, and sports;

- Operate on evenings or weekends.
- Optimize hours and provide a structured program.
- Provide programming for middle school age youth.
- Provide services unique to the community.
- Provide girls specific programming.
- Include linguistically isolated families in the outreach plan.
- Hold an end of summer culmination event highlighting the program.
- Provide job readiness and skill development.
