Organ Transplant Infection Detection and Prevention Program**

Program: The goals of the Organ Transplant Infection Detection and Prevention program are:

- 1) Support activities at participating transplant centers for enhanced surveillance for fungal infections during the post-transplant period, using similar methods and intensity of case-ascertainment, with development of valid, useful, simple surveillance methods for exportation to non-program transplant centers;
- 2) Support activities at participating transplant centers related to epidemiologic assessments and improved descriptions of established infectious syndromes through a repository of clinical samples (e.g., serial serum, bronchial-alveolar lavage) and identification of novel risk factors for disease (e.g., role of home environment in late onset aspergillosis); and
- 3) Be a national resource for assessing effectiveness of new infection prevention strategies in this population.

As invasive fungal infections represent the highest infection-related mortality in this population, initial activities should focus exclusively on these pathogens; other pathogens may be incorporated into later years of the program.

Expanding the Boundaries: Leadership in Philanthropy Project

Program: The W.K. Kellogg Foundation has issued a request for proposals for the project entitled “Expanding the Boundaries: Leadership in Philanthropy Project,” which aims to stimulate nonprofit work that broadly integrates communities of color into the world of philanthropy at large. Organizations seeking to receive this grant must propose projects meeting two objectives:

- 1) Enhance the work of emerging leaders and donors of color, and
- 2) Promote the creation and sharing of knowledge that supports these leaders and donors.

Critical to the success of both of these objectives is the building and dissemination of tools for nonprofit sustainability and innovative methods of giving related to communities of color. Grant applicants are encouraged to submit a pre-proposal letter describing the proposed project or program, measurable outcomes, and timeline for accomplishing key tasks. Projects may span one to three years. The pre-proposal letter also must identify the following categories that will characterize the proposed project or program:

- Category A: Organizations interested in exploring an innovative idea that cuts across the three dimensions of engaging new leaders and donors, generating new knowledge, and creating new tools related to integration of communities of color in mainstream philanthropy. This project or program may be local or national in scope.
- Category B: Organizations interested in enhancing and expanding an existing innovative project or program. This project or program must be collaborative and may be local or national in scope.
- Category C: Organizations interested in collaborating with other organizations to explore and promote innovative ideas on a national level. This project or program must be national in scope.

Proposals will be evaluated for funding based on the following criteria:

- Degree to which the proposed project meets the goal;
- Evidence of demand;
- Sustainability of the proposed project;
- Skills and experience of the project team;

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- Relevance to W.K. Kellogg Foundation issue areas and population groups in which they work; and
- Quality of evaluation and dissemination plans.
