Livable Communities Initiative Cooperative Agreement

Program: The purpose of the Livable Communities Initiative is to identify and showcase communities that best meet the criteria of a livable community, and to highlight promising practices that can be used by county and municipal governments throughout the country in preparing for the aging of the baby boom population. Through this cooperative agreement, the Administration on Aging will be involved substantially in the development and execution of the activities of the projects. The applicant and the Administration on Aging will work cooperatively to develop the criteria upon which the model communities will be selected and to clarify the issues to be addressed by the project. Awardee activities for this initiative are as follows:

- working collaboratively with the Administration on Aging to develop the criteria upon which the model communities will be selected;
- conducting a competitive process to identify the top eight models of Livable Communities for All Ages;
- developing a written manual consisting of case study descriptions of the models, along with other relevant technical assistance materials; and
- drafting an action plan that county and municipal governments can implement in replicating successful models of livable communities, and that can serve as a framework for discussion at the 2005 White House Conference on Aging.

Foundation for Child Development Changing Faces of America's Children – Young Scholars Program for Research on Immigrant Children

Program: The Foundation for Child Development (FCD) is accepting applications for The FCD Young Scholars Program, which focuses on understanding the changing faces of the nation's children as reflected in the current demography of the United States. The Young Scholars Program seeks to support a new generation of scholars conducting research on the development of children in immigrant families, from birth to age ten, particularly those who are living in low-income families. Given the limited research on young immigrant children, proposals focused on children from birth to age eight

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are highly encouraged. Fellowship recipients are expected to produce a book or article suitable for publication, and to articulate how their research may potentially inform public policies regarding young immigrant children. Scholars must have earned their Ph.D. within the 15 years prior to June 30, 2004 or their M.D. within seven years from completion of residency.

Child Development Research Fellowship Program**

Program: The purpose of this priority area is to announce the availability of funds for a cooperative agreement to sponsor a Child Development Research Fellowship that will allow child development professionals from the academic community the opportunity to actively participate in policy-relevant research activities associated with ACF programs. The goal of the fellowship program is to expose researchers to a policy environment and thereby to expand and enrich the field's capacity for policy-relevant research. Fellows will be able to work on-site in OPRE or an ACF-related office on research related to ACF programs on a full- time basis for a period of up to two years (renewable for a third year at the discretion of the sponsoring organization and ACF). The program is intended to stimulate the active exchange of child development research and evaluation information directly relevant to ACF programs and to inform the process of developing long-term research and evaluation agendas across the various ACF programs and in the research community at large. AmeriCorps Professional Corps

Program: The Corporation for National and Community Service has announced the availability of funding to support AmeriCorps Professional Corps programs that engage professionals to provide health, public safety, homeland security, education, and other human services in needy communities. AmeriCorps Professional Corps programs operate where insufficient numbers of qualified professionals exist to serve a critical need, and engage AmeriCorps members in service to address that need. Grants will support programs addressing community needs through the service of professionals, such as nurses, doctors, emergency medical technicians, teachers, social workers, early childhood development staff, engineers, lawyers, paralegals, police officers, and firefighters in communities with inadequate numbers of such professionals. Public or private nonprofit employers must sponsor AmeriCorps Professional Corps members and agree to pay 100 percent of AmeriCorps members' salaries and benefits. The corporation will consider requests for grants of up to \$1,000 per full-time equivalent AmeriCorps member for program and administration costs, and will provide an AmeriCorps education award of \$4,725 for members who successfully complete their full term of service. Awards will cover a period not to exceed three years.

Grants for Outreach to Target Populations under Trafficking in Persons Program

Program: The purpose of the Outreach to Victims of Human Trafficking grant program is to increase the identification of trafficking victims, and to encourage victims to leave their trafficked condition by counseling them on the programs available to assist victims, alerting local law enforcement where appropriate, and connecting the victims with a qualified service provider prepared to assist victims of trafficking.
