#### Administration on Aging

#### Aging Services Network Integrated Care Management Grants Program

**Program:** The purpose of this grants program is to support the design, implementation, and dissemination of innovative models and approaches that demonstrate how Community Aging Services Providers and Area Agencies on Aging can either build capacity to adopt capitated financing approaches or, partner with Medicare and/or Medicaid managed care organizations, to improve the delivery of services that maximize the health and quality of life for older persons. The projects funded under this program should enhance the integration of health and social services and generate new knowledge and information that will help position the Aging Services Network in the evolving health and long term care environment. Grantees are required to provide at least 25 percent of the total program costs from non-federal cash or in-kind resources in order to be considered for the award.

Community Toolbox offers organizational capacity building grants in two issue areas:

- 1) Children's Environmental Health and Justice and
- 2) Lead Poisoning Prevention.

In the Children's Environmental Health and Justice area, Community Toolbox provides grants for programmatic and organizational capacity building activities to community-based, parent/grandparent, and emerging nonprofits that increase those organizations ability and effectiveness in reducing environmental hazards that threaten the health of children. Through the Maurci Jackson Fund for Childhood Lead Poisoning Prevention, Community Toolbox provides grants for programmatic and organizational capacity building activities to community-based, parent/grandparent, and emerging nonprofits that increase those organizations' ability in preventing childhood lead poisoning. Community Toolbox welcomes applications from nonprofit community-based organizations or emerging groups working to build organizational capacity as part of their effort to prevent childhood lead poisoning or prevent environmental threats to children's health in communities at highest risk. These groups should be working primarily on childhood lead poisoning prevention or children's environmental health and justice. If working on several issues, groups must be able to prove an existing budgetary and staff commitment to childhood lead poisoning prevention or children's environmental health and justice.

Parent/grandparent and emerging groups will be given special consideration. In 2004, Community Toolbox is providing funding through a two-phase process. During Phase One, applicants are asked to submit a brief letter of intent telling Community Toolbox about their organization and proposed project. Successful Phase One applicants will receive a \$500 grant award and will be invited to submit a brief capacity building project proposal.
