

Dr. Jonathan Raab is President of Raab Associates. He has served as lead facilitator/mediator for many of the cutting edge energy, utility, and climate related stakeholder processes in the Northeast, including the Regional Greenhouse Gas Initiative (RGGI), the New England Demand Response Initiative (NEDRI), Cape Wind, and the greenhouse gas stakeholder processes in Rhode Island (which received US EPA's Outstanding Climate Protection Award in 2005) and in Maine. For over a decade, Dr. Raab has run the New England Electricity Restructuring Roundtable, and recently assisted Governor Phil Bredesen of Tennessee in running a high-level energy task force.

Prior to establishing Raab Associates, Dr. Raab served as Assistant Director of the Electric Power Division at the Massachusetts Department of Public Utilities. He holds a Ph.D. from MIT (Energy and Environmental Policy and Resource Economics), and an M.S. and A.B. from Stanford. Dr. Raab has taught courses at the University of Oregon, Stanford, and UMass (Boston). For the past three years he has taught the Sustainable Energy Policy graduate course at MIT. He is the author of [*Using Consensus Building to Improve Utility Regulation*](#) (ACEEE: Washington, D.C., 320 pages, foreword by Susan Tierney), and is on dispute resolution rosters for PJM, MAPP, the US Environmental Protection Agency, and the US Institute for Environmental Conflict Resolution.
