2011 Spring/Summer Commonwealth Corps Program

- Program:** The Massachusetts Service Alliance, in collaboration with the Commonwealth Corps Commission and Governor Deval Patrick's office, has announced a special one-time grant opportunity. This new initiative, the 2011 Spring/Summer Commonwealth Corps program, is focused on connecting middle school aged youth with university and college students for summer enrichment and service-learning opportunities. This program will fund organizations that are seeking to establish a new summer program or to expand an existing summer program to meet a demonstrated need in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts.

Healthy Relationship Peer Educator Program

- Program:** The Avon Foundation for Women has released the empowerment by mark 2010 request for proposals for the Healthy Relationship Peer Educator Program. The foundation has developed a comprehensive and need-based philanthropic strategy for this program that recognizes the importance of peer-to-peer education about healthy dating relationships among college-age people. Grantees will establish a network of Dating Peer Educators on their campuses, with funding for the cost of a trainer education program, printed materials, and education sessions. Dating peer educators should be trained to provide preventive education related to dating abuse and violence, sexual assault, harassment, stalking, and the promotion of healthy relationships; and also should be trained to provide local resources and referrals to local community-based domestic violence experts. Student programs should emphasize awareness and prevention through education. Applications should

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demonstrate the ability to initiate or expand on the work of the Dating Peer Educator Program and to garner additional support.

Program: The National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health seeks to fund research that has the greatest potential to impact public health and, thereby, to reduce the burden on the health of the workforce population. LIBRARIES

Laura Bush Foundation for America's Libraries Book Grants for School Libraries

Program: The Laura Bush Foundation for America's Libraries was founded in 2002 as a fund of the Community Foundation for the National Capital Region. Since its inception, the foundation has awarded more than \$7.3 million to 1,433 pre-kindergarten to grade 12 schools in all fifty states, the District of Columbia, Puerto Rico, the U.S. Virgin Islands, the Marshall Islands, and the Northern Mariana Islands. In addition to these grants, the foundation also has awarded more than \$5.7 million to school libraries in the Gulf Coast region to rebuild book collections that were lost or destroyed by recent hurricanes and storms. Only schools where a minimum of 50 percent of the student body qualifies for free or reduced-price lunches are eligible to apply for grants, and since research demonstrates a clear relationship between family income and a student's access to books, the foundation gives selection preference to schools in which 90 percent or more of the students receive free or reduced-price lunches and are likely to have the fewest books at home. The foundation awards grants to update, extend, and diversify the book collections of the libraries that receive them. All grants are made to individual schools rather than to school districts, county systems, private organizations, foundations, or other entities.

Program: The Institute of Museum and Library Services administers a variety of grant programs that advance the value of museums and libraries as critical resources for a nation of learners. Museum Grants for African American History and Culture are intended to build institutional capacity in the African American museum community. The program provides opportunities for staffs of African American museums to gain knowledge and abilities in the areas of management, operations, programming, collections care, and other museum skills identified as high priorities by applicants. It provides an opportunity for African American museums to design projects that will enhance institutional capacity and sustainability by utilizing professional training, technical assistance, internships, outside expertise, and other tools. For fiscal year 2011, the program invites applications that focus on one or more of the following three goals:

- 1) Developing or strengthening knowledge, skills, and other expertise of current staff at African American museums;
- 2) Attracting and retaining professionals with the skills needed to strengthen

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- African American museums; and
- 3) Attracting new staff to African American museum practice and providing them with the expertise needed to sustain them in the museum field.

Funds will support a wide range of activities that support these goals, including:

- staff exchange, mentoring, education or training, or other strategies that increase the skills needed to improve African American museum services;

- organizational support for the development and implementation of internship and fellowship programs.
