#### Funding for Innovative Television Programs

**Program:** The Independent Television Service (ITVS) annually funds, distributes, and promotes new programs produced by independent producers for public television and beyond. ITVS seeks proposals that increase diversity on public television and present a range of subjects and viewpoints. Applications are sought for the **Open Call Program** and for the **Local Independents Collaborating with Stations (LInCS) Fund**. The Open Call funding program supports innovative television programs that will attract new audiences to public television as well as expand civic participation by introducing new voices into the public discourse. The LInCS Fund provides incentive or matching moneys (\$10,000-\$75,000) to partnerships between public television stations and independent producers. Series, single shows, and interstitial packages will be considered, as will projects in any genre or stage of development.

#### Family Violence Prevention and Services Program

#### Program Announcement No. OCS-2001-07

**Program:** On a nationwide basis, a network composed of the NRC and the SIRC's will offer resource, policy, and training assistance to Federal, State, and local government agencies, to domestic violence service providers, and to other professional and interested parties on issues pertaining to domestic violence.. **Department of Education /Office of Special Education and Rehabilitative Services  
Alternative Financing Program (AFP) for Assistive Technology (AT)**

**Program:** The Alternative Financing Program (AFP) created a new Federal program to pay a share of the cost of the establishment or expansion, and administration of, an alternative financing program for assistive technology (AT). DOE this action in order to award one year grants or cooperative agreements to States and outlying areas to establish or maintain alternative financing projects to increase access AT for individuals with disabilities. Currently, major service programs such as Medicaid, special education, vocational rehabilitation, and to a limited extent, Medicare, provide AT devices and services for eligible individuals. In some instances, individuals with disabilities purchase AT with private funds however, many individuals and their families do not have the necessary resources to obtain the AT they need. Loan programs offer individuals with disabilities attractive options that significantly enhance their access to AT.

Talent Search and Educational Opportunity Centers Programs**

**Program:** The Talent Search Program provides grants to enable applicants to conduct projects designed to (1) identify qualified youths with potential for education at the postsecondary level, and encourage such youths to complete secondary school and to undertake a program of postsecondary education; (2) publicize the availability of student financial assistance available to persons who pursue a program of postsecondary education; and (3) encourage persons who have not completed programs of education at the secondary or postsecondary level, but who have the ability to complete such programs, to reenter such programs. **Program:** The purpose of the program is to establish national partnerships to enhance health and quality of life for older adults through a broad national strategy to: (1) Promote oral, physical, and mental health and healthy behaviors and practices, (2) reduce the impact of injuries and chronic diseases, and (3) maintain function and independence for older Americans. This program consists of four parts. Furthermore, Parts I, II, and IV have additional Special Emphasis Areas.

*Part II, Special Emphasis Area:* To identify programmatic best practices in community-based health promotion and disease prevention.
- **Part III:** To support a planning committee and conduct a workshop/ conference to assess the public health impact of the aging of America's workforce.
- **Part IV:** To develop consumer education tools and strategies to improve oral, physical, and mental health, reduce the impact of disease and injury, and delay disability and the need for long-term care among older adults, including those in minority and other under-served communities.  
*Part IV, Special Emphasis Area:* To assess the knowledge and beliefs specific to falls, fall risks, driving safely, and driving cessation.

**Program:** The Conflict Resolution program supports work in a wide variety of settings. The foundation favors general support grants intended to strengthen the institutional capacity of conflict resolution organizations and research centers. Grants are made in six categories: theory development; practitioner organizations; promotion of the field; consensus building, public participation, and policymaking; international conflict resolution; and emerging

issues. Inquiries should be received by the foundation at least three months prior to the deadline for submission of proposals. Applicants who receive a favorable response to their initial inquiry will be invited to submit a formal proposal.

- **Theory Development.** The Foundation is particularly interested in university-based centers that demonstrate both a strong commitment to systematic, interdisciplinary research on conflict resolution and an ability to contribute to the improvement of conflict resolution practice. The Foundation also supports collaborations of institutions and scholars in extended research undertakings of relevance to practitioners and policymakers.
- **Practitioner Organizations.** The Foundation is interested primarily in opportunities to help effective and stable groups increase their capacity for growth and outreach. Grants support new approaches and new applications of conflict resolution methods, the achievement of greater organizational maturity, and efforts to enhance the overall impact of practitioner organizations on the field and on the communities in which they work. Candidates must demonstrate either (1) the capacity to deliver services to low-income citizens and other communities that historically have been underserved by the conflict resolution field; or (2) the capacity to extend the benefits of federal or state policy initiatives in conflict resolution to a wide audience.
- **Promotion of the Field.** The Foundation supports organizations that (1) educate potential users about conflict resolution techniques; (2) serve the training and support needs of professionals and volunteers in the field of conflict resolution; and/or (3) promote the field as a whole.
- **Consensus Building, Public Participation, and Policymaking.** Recognizing that the origins of conflict can often be traced to defects in methods of communication and participation in policymaking, the Foundation assists organizations that demonstrate means of improving the processes of decision making on issues of major public importance. The Foundation's interest is focused primarily on facilitating and convening organizations that explore new ways of approaching contentious public policy issues through collaborative action that addresses the legitimate interests of all involved parties.
- **International Conflict Resolution.** The Foundation supports a limited number of organizations that are working on the international application of conflict resolution techniques and the development of practice-relevant theory related to ethnic, ideological, religious, racial, and other intergroup conflict around the world. Applicants in this area are expected to show significant field-level involvement with conflicts that have international ramifications. This is the only category of the conflict resolution program in which overseas initiatives are considered.
- **Emerging Issues.** Each year the Foundation considers a small number of proposals addressed to emerging issues in the conflict resolution field. Grants support short-term projects responsive to such critical concerns as evaluation and professional standards. Applicants must demonstrate multi-institutional involvement in the work plan and project governance, as well as compelling evidence of likely impact on the field at large.
