Coastal Pollutant Remediation Grant Program

American Legacy Foundation**Priority Populations Initiative, Expanding the Dialogue: Reducing Disparities in Tobacco Control**

Program: The Foundation will make available \$21 million over three years to support efforts integral to our mission of fostering tobacco-free generations and to our four main goals: to prevent the harm caused by tobacco use – especially among youth; to support smoking cessation efforts; to reduce exposure to secondhand smoke for all ages and populations; and to reduce health disparities among populations that are disproportionately affected by the consequences of tobacco use. The foundation encourages innovative approaches or adapting of existing evidence-based models for the specific cultural or racial/ethnic groups identified as priority populations: African American; American Indian and Alaska Native; Asian American and Pacific Islander; Hispanic/Latino; Gay/Lesbian/Bisexual/Transgender; and low-social-economic status populations.

Deadline: July 23, 2001 or December 19, 2001.

Funds: The \$21 million in available funds will be divided into seven equal shares for each of these six priority populations and one share for cross-population collaborative projects. Two types of awards will be available: capacity building grants for up to one year (\$75,000 - \$100,000) and innovative projects and applied research grants for up to three years, based on annual reviews (\$75,000 - \$200,000 per year).

Eligible: Grants are only open to non-profit, tax-exempt 501(c)(3) organizations and local political subdivisions in the 46 states (not Texas, Florida, Minnesota and Mississippi), the District of Columbia, five territories (American Samoa, Guam, Northern Mariana Islands, Puerto Rico and the Virgin Islands) identified in the Master Settlement Agreement. A Reservation, Indian Tribe or Tribal Organization located within the 46 settling states or a non-governmental entity that serves such a reservation may also apply for funding. No grants will be awarded to organizations currently receiving funds from any tobacco company.

National Institute of Child Health and Human Development Improving Contraceptive Practice and Delivery

Program: To address the many public health and other concerns associated with unplanned pregnancies, the National Institute of Child Health and Human Development (NICHD) seeks to foster research that can result in improved contraceptive use in the United States. This initiative complements other efforts of the NICHD to support research on delaying the onset of sexual activity and reducing risky sexual behavior, and is aimed at contributing to knowledge that could be directly applied to feasible and sustainable strategies to improve contraceptive use in the United States. The initiative has the following three main aims:

- ✓ Conduct basic research that will directly inform strategies to support effective contraceptive use among individuals and couples seeking to prevent or delay pregnancy;
- ✓ Conduct research to identify and evaluate innovations in clinical practice and family planning service delivery that will lead to measurable improvements in contraceptive practice; and
- ✓ Support basic and applied research addressing the influence of policy and the structure and financing of reproductive health services on effective contraceptive use, and the cost-effectiveness of alternative approaches to structuring and financing contraceptive services.

Program: To award cooperative agreements to adoption organizations for the purpose of developing and implementing Infant Adoption Awareness Training Programs (IAATP) to train the designated staff of eligible health centers in providing adoption information and referrals to

pregnant women on an equal basis with all other courses of action included in nondirective counseling to pregnant women. Adoption organizations (grantees) will be required to develop and implement curricula that are consistent with best-practices guidelines that will be provided to recipients pursuant to the award of the cooperative agreement. Adoption organizations funded under this priority area will be required to develop and implement curricula to train staff at eligible health centers who provide or who, after training, will provide pregnancy or adoption information and referrals. The grantees will need to provide instruction on their curricula to trainers, who will provide training to health center staff. Department of Transportation/National Highway Traffic Safety Administration Discretionary Cooperative Agreements To Assist in the Development of Crash Outcome Data Evaluation System

Program: The objective of this Cooperative Agreement program is to provide for the following program activities:

- ✓ Coordinate the development and institutionalization of the capability to link state crash and medical outcome data to identify the medical and financial consequences of motor vehicle crashes.
- ✓ Utilize this information in crash analysis, problem identification, and program evaluation to improve decision-making at the local, state, and national levels related to preventing or reducing deaths, injuries, and direct medical costs associated with motor vehicle crashes.
- ✓ Provide NHTSA with population-based linked crash and injury data to analyze specific highway safety issues of interest to NHTSA in collaboration with the CODES states.
- ✓ Develop data linkage capabilities as a means of improving the quality of state data that support NHTSA's national data. State data systems are stronger and more likely to survive when developed and supported by state funds. So, this cooperative agreement is not intended to fund basic development of state data systems, but rather to create linkages among existing state data. States with insufficient state data to perform the CODES linkages are encouraged to expedite the improvement of their state data with state resources to become eligible for CODES funding.
